Second Session Council Instructions 1/17/24 9:45pm MST

Good Evening to all and Happy Birthday to _____! 😊

A couple of quick items of business:

- 1) We are still planning on starting Sunday at 2:00 pm. Several members of the council have a hard stop at 5:00 pm, so we will need to have things wrapped up no later than 5:00 pm.
- 2) Since I sent the email to [MIQ] around 12 noon today, I extended the deadline for him to respond until Friday at 12 noon to give him a full 48 hours instead of 24. I told [his wife] that she has until Friday at 12 noon as well to send her written statement.
- 3) As mentioned, I had an (unplanned) conversation with Denver last night when he called to ask Dave about his upcoming knee surgery. Dave put him on speaker so I could ask a few basic procedural questions and Denver was kind enough to answer. I was extremely careful not to mention any names; just simply said I was on a women's council and wanted to make sure I understood things correctly according to scripture.

The first thing I asked was, "What happens if the wife of a man whose priesthood certificate is being questioned by a women's council states to the council that she no longer endorses her husband and asks that her name be removed? Hence, by revoking her signature — does it automatically invalidate his certificate because it requires his wife's signature to be valid?

His answer was no. The guidance we have as of now is that once a man obtains a certificate, it requires a Women's Council to remove it.

Then I asked him about unanimity. I explained that we have 13 women participating on the council because, at one point, we weren't sure if _____ would be able to register her vote before leaving at 8:45. So, we had called an extra member in case a situation developed where one member was unable to vote for some reason. Therefore, my question was, "Because we have 13 women voting, must all 13 be unanimous? Or do we just need 12 of the 13 women to vote in unanimity even if the 13th woman votes the opposite of the other 12?

His answer was that if we have 13 women vote, then all 13 have to be unanimous. If we have 12 women vote, then all 12 have to be unanimous. However, since we have 13 voters, if one woman chooses to abstain (meaning they choose not to vote at all — neither to retain nor revoke the certificate) or one of the women has to leave early, then the remaining 12 voters must be unanimous.

Hope this helps to clarify some things. I know it did for me.
Thanks again for all your help and patience in this matter.
